As veterans we have opportunities that other less than honest individuals will want access to so do your homework on the business. Talk to an attorney and listen to your instincts.

Local Business Owner Convicted of Conspiring to Defraud the VA

HOUSTON – A 55-year-old Pearland resident has entered a guilty plea to conspiracy to commit wire fraud, announced U.S. Attorney Ryan K. Patrick.

Henry Guillory admitted that beginning on Nov. 21, 2012, he was engaged in a conspiracy to defraud the Department of Veteran Affairs (VA).

The VA awards contracts to qualified companies that disabled veterans own as part of the Service Disabled Veteran Owned Small Business (SDVOSB) program.

Guillory recruited a service disabled veteran to falsely claim majority ownership of a Houston-based company named MEP Sales and Service (MEP), while Guillory, the true majority owner, claimed minority ownership. This was done so as to get MEP certified as a SDVOSB thereby providing MEP the ability to be awarded contracts. Because of their fraudulent claims, MEP was wrongfully awarded 12 VA small business set-aside contracts totaling more than \$1.6 million that should have been given to legitimate veteran-owned small businesses. All 12 of these set-aside contracts were for maintenance and/or construction work at the DeBakey VA Medical Center.

U.S. District Judge Alfred H. Bennett accepted the plea and set sentencing for July 12, 2018, at which time Guillory faces up to five years in federal prison and a possible \$250,000 maximum fine. He was permitted to remain on bond pending that hearing.

VA - Office of Inspector General conducted the investigation. Assistant U.S. Attorney Daniel C. Rodriguez is prosecuting the case.




Don't Get Caught Unprepared

Check out the newest workshop offered by the TPVA SA Chapter.

What is an emergency? Am I prepared for the consequences of an emergency?

Who would take care of me, if I can't take care of myself?

What do I need to do to make sure that my family will be okay if anything happens to me?

When a catastrophe strikes, are you prepared to handle it? If each of us had a crystal ball or we could gaze into the future, we'd all be a lot happier OR MAYBE NOT!

Nobody really knows what the future holds for us, but there are ways we can better prepare for it.

More and more, we are discovering that many of our vets and their families are ill prepared. Dr. Jeff Dersh, psychologist, and a few of his colleagues and helpers aim to resolve that problem by offering ongoing workshops to help our vets be better prepared for going forward in life no matter what the future holds.

If you don't have the answers to these questions, it would be helpful to attend these free workshops offered at the VA beginning in June. There will be space for eight people at a time and the sessions will be held beginning on June 7, time and place to be announced.

Dear Cici

Dear Cici,

I'm getting more and more alarmed at the number of spouses who don't know how to take care of business after the death of a loved one. I just returned from a funeral in Louisiana. The deceased was a disabled vet and the caregiver has had a nervous breakdown because she had no clue as to how to proceed on her own. There is only so much the VA can do. Why don't people want to face the reality that life will end at some point? What stops them from being prepared for it?

Dear Carrie,

This is really a follow up to a recent Dear Cici column. In that column, we addressed the need to have all important documents in one place in the event of an emergency. It is also important to share with dependable family members where that information is kept.

Now, Carrie, to answer your question. There is no one answer to why people don't think or talk about death and its ramifications. Many people fear death, so they naturally don't want to talk about the prospect of dying. However, we all know it is inevitable. Being prepared would seem the most logical approach to safeguarding the welfare of our loved ones after we die. Being prepared, again a logical approach, would make living so much easier because you would not have to worry about what will happen to your family if anything should happen to you.

Making a will and an advanced directive is the first logical step to being prepared. If you and your loved one are procrastinating, then set a date for discussion and don't make excuses to get out of doing so. The easiest thing to do is to make an appointment right now at the nearest base legal office. The clerk will set up the appointment and ask you to come in and get a worksheet. You can actually pick up a worksheet before you make the appointment. (You can also go online to get a free worksheet at Lawdepot.com/wills.) On the day of the appointment, you'll be assigned a lawyer to go over the worksheet. An official document will be made up for you and you will have a group consultation to answer any questions you might have. Total time spent is approximately one and a half hours. We usually spend more time than that playing a round of golf or watching a movie.

This is no different than any of the other important things we do in life. Every year, we make preparations for paying taxes, for paying insurance, for renewing permits and licenses. If your family means anything to you, you'll make sure they will be taken care of.

Perhaps your chapter of PVA can host an educational session on the importance of wills and advanced directives. The San Antonio Satellite Chapter will be conducting a session soon.

Gabriel Diaz De Leon - Nominated for Board Member #1

In 1984, Diaz De Leon was an officer in the U.S. Army. While deployed in Honduras during a routine convoy escort, the vehicle in which he was riding took enemy fire. The steering column was shot in half, the jeep flipped several times, Diaz de Leon was thrown 30 feet and he was left with injuries that resulted in permanent paralysis in all four limbs.

Since then, he has been on five U.S. Paralympic teams, five U.S. World Championships teams, and played four years of collegiate wheelchair basketball at the University of Texas Arlington where he won two national championships ('89, '92). Diaz de Leon is also one of the most decorated U.S. field athletes, having won six Paralympic medals in the discus, javelin and shot-put events.

He retired from competition in the sport after the 2004 Paralympic Games in Athens, Greece. In 2008, Diaz de Leon won the national championship in A Division at the American Wheelchair Bowling Championships. In 2010, he was elected to the Athletes with Disabilities Half of Fame and in 2011, he was chosen as one of the seated throws coaches for the U.S. World championships team that competed in Christchurch, New Zealand.

VA Infertility Services

VA infertility services help Veterans and their spouses

Our nation's Veterans bravely serve our country knowing they may return as civilians with service-connected disabilities. However, in deciding to join the military they probably did not consider they might have to sacrifice parenthood.

Good news. If you are a Veteran with service-connected infertility, you may be eligible for treatment. VA regulations were amended to offer in vitro fertilization (IVF) evaluation and treatment to Veterans with service-connected conditions that resulted in infertility, as well as to their spouses. This is a long-awaited benefit for many Veteran couples.

VA also provides infertility evaluation, management, and treatment services to all Veterans who are enrolled and eligible for VA health care, regardless of service-connection. Infertility care is available either at your local VA medical facility or through referral to health care providers in your community. For more information, check out the VA Infertility Brochure.

How to Access VA's Infertility Services

Veterans interested in infertility services should contact their VA health care provider. Veterans can also contact their local VA Women Veteran Program Manager for more information about infertility services.

Adopting? You may be eligible for reimbursement.

VA is now providing reimbursement of qualifying adoption expenses incurred by Veterans with a service-connected disability that results in infertility. Covered Veterans may request reimbursement for qualifying adoption expenses incurred for adoption finalized after September 29, 2016. More information can be found on the [Federal Register](#).

Archery, I picked up the Chapter's bows we used at the event a few days early and got a couple of days of practice in with that in my back yard. Tomahawk throw? Well no practice there!

So, did the practice pay off? You bet it did! I had top score in pistol and archery and tied for first with rifle. Shotgun I had a respectable score but not the top and tomahawk throw I didn't get one stuck in the log. Enough good scores though to total up to this year's Champion again. So, practice, practice, practice. More importantly, if you do something that's fun you'll get out of the house and do it often. That's the whole point of the PVA's adaptive sports programs. Try something new and you might really like it. If you like it, you'll get out of the house and do it again and again.

I'd like to thank Kroger for donating supplies and especially Ronnie Lofton and his big group of family, friends and volunteers who make this event possible and the great tasting fish fry that tops it all off. Not to mention the awards and prizes raffled off too. Everybody is a winner at this event. So, get out there and practice and I hope to see you there next year.


